

## Handout for “Free Websites for German Genealogy” Program

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### FamilySearch.org

- Not all records have been made searchable; always check the Catalog (<https://www.familysearch.org/en/search/catalog>)
- Make sure to also check “Full Text” Search on FamilySearch Labs ([familysearch.org/en/labs/](https://www.familysearch.org/en/labs/))
- Has many German civil vital records
  - i.e., “Personenstandsregister,” “Standesamtsregister,” “Zivilstandsregister”
  - Or, more specifically, “Geburts-,” “Heiraten-,” or “Sterbenregister”
- Has a moderate amount of German church records
  - Not as extensive Protestant holdings as the paid website [www.Archion.de](http://www.Archion.de)

### Matricula

- Access at [data.matricula-online.eu/en/](http://data.matricula-online.eu/en/) or just google “Matricula”
- Primarily German Catholic church records (baptisms, marriages, burials)

### JewishGen.org

- All records free
- Advanced search capabilities are restricted without a \$100 donation
  - Site is still very usable in free mode

### CompGen (Genealogy.net)

- Especially their wiki ([wiki.genealogy.net](http://wiki.genealogy.net)) which includes, most notably:
  - Adressbücher (address books)
  - GEDBAS (family tree database)
  - GOV (historic geo information system)
  - Grabsteine (gravestones)

### Geography sites

- CompGen’s GOV database (aforementioned)
- Meyers Gazetteer

## Deciphering old German vocabulary

- German Genealogical Word List
  - Go to [familysearch.org/en/wiki/German\\_Genealogical\\_Word\\_List](http://familysearch.org/en/wiki/German_Genealogical_Word_List)
- Grimm's Wörterbuch (German Dictionary by the Brothers Grimm)
  - Go to [woerterbuchnetz.de/?sigle=DWB](http://woerterbuchnetz.de/?sigle=DWB)
  - or google "digitale Grimm" and then click the blue "Online-Wörterbuch" button
  - If you don't read German, can copy a dictionary entry from the online Grimm Dictionary and paste it into Google Translate (translate.google.com)

## Civil Vital Records

- Generally cover 1870s through early 1900s. Sometimes start earlier (some regions started keeping civil vital records in the 1840s-1850s, some during the Napoleonic era of the 1810s, some back in 1790s).

Personenstandsregister	Personen <i>Persons</i>	stands <i>status</i>	register <i>register</i>
Standesamtsregister	Standes <i>Status</i>	amts <i>district office</i>	register <i>register</i>
Standesbücher	Standes <i>Status</i>	bücher <i>books</i>	
Zivilstandsregister	Zivil <i>Civil</i>	stands <i>status</i>	register <i>register</i>

### Birth registers

Geburts-, Geburten- -register (example: *Geburtsregister*)

### Marriage registers

Heirats-, Heiraten-, Trau- -register (example: *Heiratsregister*)

### Death registers

Sterbe-, Sterbeneben-, Toten- -register (example: *Totenregister*)

### Duplicate registers (duplicated copies of the originals)

-neben- (literally translates to "next to")

For instance:

Sterbe	neben	register	(example: <i>Sterbenebenregister</i> )
<i>Death</i>	<i>duplicate</i>	<i>register</i>	

Individual documents are called: Akten, Dokumente, or Urkunden  
(example: *Geburtsakten* or *Sterbenurkunden*)

#### Arcinsys websites

- Some German states have Arcinsys (archival information system) websites.
- To find digitized objects on an Arcinsys site:
  - 1. Click “Search” near the top of the site
  - 2. Click “Extended Search” in the drop-down menu
  - 3. Insert keywords in the “Search words” field(s)
    - Can search by town name, and/or source type, and/or even an individual person’s name (can’t find an individual’s name in a vital records register, but can find documents if the individual had something like a legal/criminal/tax document generated about them)
  - 4. Will usually want to check the “Only objects with digital copies” checkbox
    - Sometimes a data entry without a digital object associated with it will have usable information, but often it’s just metadata
  - 5. Click the blue “Search” button
  - 6. Click the red “Show details page” for any desired source

#### German military records online

- Hessian subsidy troops (1700s) - e.g., used by Britain in American Revolution

    - The above list is not comprehensive. Just a few examples. There are way too many to list here!
  - There are always new newspaper digitization projects coming online. Search for others by googling the name of the town/city, district/region, or state + the word “Zeitungen” (German word for ‘newspapers’)

## Google Books

- Google Books is in the process of digitizing out-of-copyright books (including German-language books), mostly from 100 years ago or older
  - Visit [books.google.com](http://books.google.com)

## Emailing German archives through their websites

- If it is one document you are requesting, and you know the exact name/date, many (though not all) German archives will do a single simple lookup request for free
  - Confirm with the archive if they intend to charge any fees before you place the lookup request
- If you are fuzzy on some of the details and it would require them to actually do research to find the document (i.e., not just a simple document retrieval), then you will be charged
- Basic word for archive is “Archiv,” and it is often combined with prefix like “Staats-” (state–civil), “Stadt-” (city–civil), “Landes-” (region–civil), or “Landeskirchliches” (region–ecclesiastical)
- Emails are almost always sufficient these days, no need to spend money on postage
- Most German archives can work with emails in English, but might not be a bad idea to also copy and paste a Google Translated German version of your message into the email as well
